"Broadly defined, the act of providing material assistance to people in need has existed throughout human history, often in the form of food or material aid provided during famine, drought or natural disaster. Yet the **modern concept and system of** humanitarian aid as we know it; the impartial, independent and neutral provision of aid to those in immediate danger; has only existed since the mid part of the 20th century." - Rysback-Smith (Brown University, Emergency Medicine Department, 2016)

Military branches involved

- Air Force: Airdrops food and medical supplies, rescues people from natural disasters, and prevents the spread of disease
- Navy: Provides medical care, distributes supplies, and helps with rescues at sea
- Army: Participates in disaster relief efforts, including wildfires and hurricanes
- National Guard: Responds to wildfires and other emergencies

Military units also participate in humanitarian exercises to train for these missions. These exercises also provide free medical care to communities.










Pediatric Humanitarian Care During Wartime ->

- Direct Pediatric Trauma Care Practices
- Pediatric Surgical Interventions >1/3 of caseload in Humanitarian Field
- 10% of all bed-days
- 63% of pediatric patients required surgery/ortho procedures



Military Pediatricians deployed to Combat Zones → 40%

Military Pediatricians participated in Peacetime Humanitarian Mission → 35.5%



- Residents, Fellows, Attendings, Nurse Practitioners, Nurses, Techs, etc.




